Animal, Vegetable, Miracle: A Year of Food Life

By Barbara Kingsolver

Novelist Barbara Kingsolver (*Poisonwood Bible*, *Prodigal Summer*)

and her family leave Tucson, Arizona to live on a farm in southern Appalachia. The family vows to buy only food that has been raised in their own neighborhood, to grow it themselves, or learn to live without it.

Part memoir and part investigative reporting that makes the reader aware of the important issues facing us today, one fact is that the

average food item on your local grocery shelf has traveled farther than most families go on their

annual vacation. She states that it is not necessary to live on a food producing farm to participate in this culture, but it is necessary to know such a culture exists. Kingsolver advocates that when shopping at your local farmers market or neighborhood grocery store to be aware of where the food comes from and to buy local and in season as it helps the farmers and the environment.

Each chapter in the book tells of the trial and tribulations of the growing process for that month. The chapters are all told in a humorous and knowledgeable way that compliments what we do as gardeners.

Husband Steven Hopp contributions are thoughtful and informative; her daughter Camille's recipes sound delicious.
