

## **Heavenly Acre Farm**

The agricultural tradition of La Habra Heights continues at Heavenly Acre Farm where Karissa Lystrup and her brothers and sisters grow and sell a variety of organic fruits, vegetables and other home made and home grown products. Theirs has been a very successful venture despite difficulties which have arisen over the last two years, and this reflects their adaptability and perseverance as they continue to provide quality products to their customers.

Initially, they ran a roadside stand with a display of currently available products. After the stand was vandalized, the children decided to sell their produce via a website. This has proved to be a very effective method, as customers (from a mailing list of over 500 people) check the website for currently available products (updated weekly), place their orders, and pick them up between 9 and 11 a.m. every Saturday.

Karissa has attended over 20 hours of computer networking and problem solving classes with her father, so has quite a bit of expertise in managing their website. Though neither she nor any of her siblings plan a career in agriculture or horticulture, their experiences running a small business have been valuable training for whatever careers they choose.

These multitalented young people exemplify a quality which good gardeners share—perseverance despite difficulties.

## **Ants in the House?**

Hot weather and rainy weather seem to bring ants inside houses. [www.wisegeek.com](http://www.wisegeek.com) offers these remedies to keep them out:

“ Ants will crawl away from cinnamon, mint, red [chili](#) powder, and [black pepper](#). All of them can be sprinkled on countertops or cupboards, as they're not poisonous and highly effective. Planting mint and [cloves](#) in windowsills or outdoor gardens around the home will also help keep ants out of your house. [Bay leaves](#), especially when dipped into mint mouthwash and placed around the food [pantry](#), are another helpful option.

Creating a ring of Vaseline or chalk around windows and doors also helps, as ants will not cross lines drawn with any of these products. Baby powder is another great ant

repellent. Sprinkling some on doors will keep ants out of your house.

Ants also hate [vinegar](#). For an easy solution, just mix equal parts of vinegar and water and then sprinkle on counters and other food storage and preparation areas. If there are no small children or pets in the house, you can also use [glass](#) cleaner to spray areas in other rooms outside of the kitchen.
