Enrichment Program: Irrigation

Don Grime has been active with the Master Gardeners since the first class in 1995 and was classmates with Jeri Young and Virginia Carlson. Since that time, he has volunteered at the Fullerton Arboretum as a Potter and as a Nature Guide, which he is still doing. He also worked on a couple of school gardens and the hot line, which he initiated. Together with the late Pat Sawyer, a previous Master Gardener, he started the Plant Specialist program at the Fullerton Arboretum, which he would like to see revived.

Don obtained a certificate in Landscape Horticulture at Fullerton College in 2003. His studies at Fullerton College included Water Principles and Practices, in which he has been active with ever since. Landscape irrigation is a complicated subject so Don would like to review some of the key principles.

While on the OC Grand Jury in 2007-2008 and during a drought, Don participated in study called "Water Budgets, Not Water Rationing" and he will share some highlights from the report.

Don has developed a watering calculator to simplify irrigation computations, which he would like to share with the group. Anyone that brings a laptop to the meeting will be able to download the watering calculator and follow it themselves while it is being demonstrated

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Saving Heirloom Seeds

It's that time of the year when our vegetable gardens are in full production. If you've found a variety you want to grow next year, how about saving the seeds? You can start seedlings for our plant exchange, for your friends, family, and neighbors, and for yourself.

One good source for information on saving and buying heirloom seeds is longtime proponent of heirlooms, www.seedsavers.org. Their instructions for tomato seed saving are:

Seed Saving: Cross-pollination between modern tomato varieties seldom occurs, except in potato leaf varieties which should be separated by the length of the garden. Do not save seeds from double fruits or from the first fruits of large-fruited varieties. Pick at least one ripe fruit from each of several plants. Squeeze seeds and juice into a strainer and wash, spread on a paper plate, and dry.

These instructions differ from those given on the www.sunset.com website:

Wash your heirloom tomatoes, then cut it in half across the middle (not the stem end). Gently

squeeze tomato seeds and juice into a labeled glass or plastic container. Fill containers about half full, then set them out of direct sun in an area where you won't be bothered by the ripening odor or fruit flies.

Allow the seed mixture to sit until the surface is partially covered with whitish mold (in three to five days). In warm climates, you may need to add a little water midway through the process to keep the seeds afloat. Scrape off the white mold with a spoon, being careful not to remove seeds.

Fill the container with water, then stir; the good seeds will sink to the bottom.

Pour off and discard floating seeds and pulp. Repeat until the good seeds are clean. Pour the cleaned seeds into a fine strainer; rinse and drain

Sprinkle seeds onto a plate and allow them to dry for one to three days, depending on the weather. Keep them out of direct sun. To make sure they dry thoroughly and don't stick together, stir twice a day.

Store dried seeds in a cool, dry, dark place in individually labeled airtight containers such as a glass jar until planting time next spring.
